on top of the world	extremely happy	She was feeling on top of the world.
be over the moon	be very pleased	She was over the moon about her new bike.
down in the dumps	unhappy	She's a bit down in the dumps because she failed one of her exams.
have butterflies in your stomach	be very nervous about sth you are going to do	I had terrible butterflies before I gave that talk at the conference in Paris.
beat around the bush	avoid talking about what is important	Don't beat around the bush - get to the point!
stick to your guns	refuse to change your beliefs or actions	My parents didn't want me to be an actor, but I stuck to my guns.
against all the odds	do sth although you were not likely to succeed	Against all the odds, he recovered.
call it a day	decide to finish (usually finish working)	I'm getting a bit tired now - let's call it a day.
once in a blue moon	very rarely	My sister lives in Alaska, so I only see her once in a blue moon.
not have a minute to call your own	be very busy	Ever since the twins were born, I haven't had a minute to call my own.

ring a bell	sound familiar	The name rang a bell but I couldn't remember where I had heard it before.
give sb the sack	fire sb	They gave him the sack for being late.
make matters worse	make the situation even more difficult	Don't say anything - you'll only make matters worse.
go downhilll	gradually become worse	After his wife died, his health started to go downhill.
have sth up your sleeve	have secret plans or ideas	If I know Mark, he'll have one or two tricks up his sleeve.
go Dutch	share the cost of sth, especially a meal	You don't have to pay for me. Let's go Dutch today.
pain in the neck	sth or sb that is very annoying	One of my students is a real pain in the neck
give sb the cold shoulder	ignore sb in an unpleasant way	I tried to be pleasant to her but she gave me the cold shoulder
pull sb's leg	make sb believe sth that is not true, as a joke	Is it really your car or are you pulling my leg?
off the top of your head	from the knowledge you have in your memory	"What's the capital of Mauritania?" "I don't know off the top of my head, but I could go and look it up.
make a difference	improve a situation a lot	Exercise can make a big difference to your state of health.
make sb's day	make sb happy/satisfied	Seeing Adrian again after such a long time really made my day
see red	become extremely angry	People who don't finish a job really make me see red.
green with envy	very envious	When I heard about his new job I was green with envy.
be in your element	be happy because you are doing what you like or can do best	Kate, of course, was in her element, making all the arrangements.
hit the roof	become extremely angry	Dad'll hit the roof when he finds out I've left school.
fly off the handle	to suddenly become very angry	You have to be very careful because he flies off the handle very easily.
follow suit	do the same thing as sb else	When one airline reduces its prices, the rest soon follow suit.

hit the jackpot	have a big success or make a big profit, usually through luck	He seems to have hit the jackpot with his new invention.
face the music	accept criticism or punishment for sth you have done	If she lied to me, then she'll just have to face the music.
set the record straight	write or say sth to make the true facts known	She's decided to write her memoirs to set the record straight.
be (as) fit as a fiddle	be very healthy and strong	My grandmother's 89, but she's as fit as a fiddle.
take a leaf out of sb's book	copy sth that sb else does because it will bring you advantages	Maybe I should take a leaf out of Rick's book and start coming in early every morning.
sit on the fence	delay making a decision	You can't sit on the fence any longer - you have to decide whose side you're on.
take the biscuit	be annoying or surprising	And you say she's opening your letters now? Oh, that really takes the biscuit!
have a bone to pick with sb	want to talk to sb about sth annoying they have done	I've got a bone to pick with you - you've been using my shaver again.
show sb the ropes	show someone how to do a job or activity	Lynn spent an afternoon showing the new girl the ropes.
be at a loss	not know what to do or say	He was at a loss for words.
hustle and bustle	noise and activity	I love the hustle and bustle of the marketplace.
the icing on the cake	sth that makes a good situation even better	He was delighted to have his story published – getting paid for it was just icing on the cake.
the cutting edge	the most recent and advanced stage of development	We want to be at the cutting edge of this technology.
by hook or by crook	by any method possible	I decided I was going to get that job by hook or by crook.
on a shoestring	with a very small amount of money	The film was made on a shoestring.
on the spur of the moment	sudden and done without any planning	We just jumped in a car on the spur of the moment and drove to the seaside.
look daggers at sb	look angrily at sb	She looked daggers at me when I mentioned her ex-boyfriend.

speak your mind	say what you think about sth very directly	He's certainly not afraid to speak his mind.
be in sb's shoes	be in the situation that another person is in	I wouldn't like to be in Mike's shoes when the boss hears what he's done!
